Anniversary Celebration

TRIANGLE, Va. – The Marine Corps Heritage Foundation (MCHF) today celebrates Kentucky Marines, as part of the organization's yearlong *Marines Across America* program to mark the Marine Corps' 250th Anniversary. The program highlights Marines who embody the values of honor, courage, and commitment within their communities and showcases the contributions Marines make in their local communities or nationally following their active-duty service.

"Marines have always made their mark on the battlefield, but it's important to remember they've also made their mark in their hometowns and communities," said retired Marine Major General James Lukeman, President and CEO of MCHF. "As we celebrate 250 years of the Marine Corps, we honor the significant contributions that Marines from Kentucky have made to our nation. It's an opportunity for all residents of Kentucky to commemorate this historic milestone and show their appreciation for all Marines who stand ready to protect our nation and continue to put Marine values to work in their communities and professional lives."

Notable Marines with Kentucky ties include:

- Al Botts (Mount Sterling, Kentucky): After serving 20 years in the Marine Corps, including participating in the first Gulf War, Botts turned to serving his community, first as a councilmember and now in his current position as mayor of Mount Sterling. He is passionate about empowering both his local and military communities through honest reflections on his service and is dedicated to mentoring the next generation of leaders.
- Christel Blocker (Louisville, Kentucky): Following her service in the Marine Corps, Blocker made education a priority and earned a Bachelor of Science in organizational leadership from the University of Louisville, where she currently serves as the assistant director of Student Services. Outside of her professional role, she advocates for underrepresented communities, with a focus on supporting individuals with autism. Blocker is passionate about empowering others and creating positive change.
- Sam Deeds (Louisville, Kentucky): After a combat injury concluded his 14 years of service in the Marine Corps, Deeds became an advocate for various nonprofits to raise awareness for PTSD, traumatic brain injuries, and veteran suicide. He is a ground safety specialist for Team Fastrax, a professional skydive team that performs designed stunts for television, festivals, and veteran support events. Deeds is also a staff

- member at Kentucky Wounded Heroes Inc. and was twice inducted into the Kentucky Veterans Hall of Fame for his community work.
- Michael Lathon (Louisville, Kentucky): Lathon gained extensive construction management experience during his 22 years of service in the Marine Corps, which enabled him to purchase and grow AACON General Contractors, a premier construction firm. The *Marines Across America* program continues throughout 2025, leading to the official 250th birthday of the Marine Corps on Nov. 10, which will be marked nationwide with official cake-cutting ceremonies taking place at all 50 state capitals.
